INDIVIDUAL RETIRMENT ACCOUNT (IRA) GIFTS — Under the current tax law you must take your first required minimum distribution (RMD) for the year in which you turn age 72 (70 ½ if you reached it before January 1, 2020). You can give any amount up to \$100,000 per year from your IRA directly to a qualified charity without having to pay income tax on the money. This is known as an IRA charitable

rollover. Please consult your tax adviser and kindly instruct your retirement account broker to make the check payable to the Archbishop's Annual Appeal, and mail it to P.O. Box 28, Hartford, CT 06141-0028. Please call the Appeal office at 800.781.2550 with any questions you may have regarding this gift.

PLEDGED GIFTS — Appeal gifts may be paid over five months. Please consider including your first month's payment with your pledge card.

CORPORATE MATCHING GIFTS — Every year several local companies give generously to the Archbishop's Annual Appeal through matching gift programs, allowing them to support causes that are important to their employees. Please contact your Human Resources Department to determine if your company will match your gift.

Reaching Out

The COVID-19 pandemic has taken a serious toll on our communities impacting our overall health and well being, our financial stability and our entire way of life. Many of our neighbors are facing economic hardships, some for the first time ever. It is only because of the extraordinary generosity of Appeal donors that we are able to continue to fund archdiocesan ministries that help to serve the poor, hungry and homeless, help care for our elderly priests, nurture vocations, educate our young, strengthen our religious education efforts, minister to the sick and elderly, and much more.

One ministry that continues **Reaching Out** to help is the Vicariate Outreach Program. The Archdiocese of Hartford through the Vicariate Outreach Program has distributed in excess of \$18 million to local organizations since 1997. Last year, for the fifth consecutive year, over \$1 million was allocated to over 200 different organizations in Hartford, New Haven and Litchfield counties. As the pandemic continues, these organizations are assisting more people than ever before and because of donors to the Appeal we were again able to provide those working on the front lines additional financial assistance in this time of crisis.
